Topic: "Elder Law: What You Need to Know"

Speaker: Michael N. Connors

Michael N. Connors was born in 1950 on the Upper East Side of Manhattan. His family moved to Bay Ridge, Brooklyn, in 1954, and he remains there today with his wife and son. After his 1972 graduation from Pace University, Mr. Connors served in the United States Army with the Military Police in Germany. Upon his honorable discharge he enrolled in Brooklyn Law School, and graduated in 1979 (Magister: Phi Delta Phi, 1978-1979). Mr. Connors opened his private practice in Bay Ridge in 1981 and formed Connors and Sullivan in 1986. He specializes in Trusts and Estates with a strong emphasis in Estate Planning and Elder Law.

Through regular seminars Mr. Connors devotes much of his time to educating the community on estate planning. In particular, these seminars focus on asset protection and taxation. Mr. Connors has shared his estate planning expertise with innumerable churches, community centers, hospitals, and nursing homes. For the benefit of their employees, HBO filmed Mr. Connors' seminar, Elder Care and the Law. Mr. Connors also regularly appeared on the cable television show Ask the Lawyer, a production of the Prayer Channel (now NET). He has also appeared on CNN-NY1 News and ABC News. Mr. Connors has received numerous awards, including the Bay Ridge Community Council Annual Civic Award and he was selected as the 2010 Bay Ridge St. Patrick's Day Parade Grand Marshal. Mr. Connors served on the New York State Governor's Advisory Committee for the Aging for more than fifteen years and the New York State Ethics Commission Public Advisory Council for more than six years. He is the former Judge Advocate General for the Catholic War Veterans, Department of New York and also the Catholic War Veterans of the United States of America. Mr. Connors currently serves on the Board of Directors of The Civil War Round Table of New York and the Manhattan Chapter of Legatus.

HLAA, Consumer Groups Meet with the FCC on Caption Quality Standards

In a meeting with the staff at the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) December 6, 2013, HLAA, TDI, NAD, and ALDA expressed strong support for the creation of measurable standards that would ensure that programming produced for television has consistently good quality captioning. We urged standards that include non-technical standards for completeness (i.e., verbatim captions of spoken dialogue and audible events), accuracy, readability, and synchronicity, and technical aspects including, proper encoding, pass-through, and transmission. HLAA and other consumer groups have offered to work with members of industry and the FCC to see quality captions become a reality.



Hearing Aid Tax Credit Reintroduced in the US Senate

Senators Tom Harkin (D-IA) and Dean Heller (R-NV) reintroduced the Hearing Aid Tax Credit on November 13, and they plan to work to insure that the legislation is considered when Congress addresses tax reform. The bi-partisan bill is nearly identical to legislation introduced in the past, and it is similar to H.R.1317 that was introduced in the House of Representatives in February by Reps. Tom Latham (R-IA) and Carolyn McCarthy (D-NY). Both bills would provide a tax credit of \$500 per device to people of all ages who need a hearing aid.

Senator Harkin has been a long-time champion of hearing health issues since joining the Senate in 1985, and Senator Heller has emerged as the new Republican champion in the Senate after Senator Olympia Snowe (R-ME) retired in December. The reintroduction effort was supported by joint teams from HIA and HLAA during Hearing on the Hill (HOTH) earlier this year, as well as by HOTH teams from ADA, ASHA and IHS. HLAA Brings Movie Captions to AMC Theaters in NY State

The Manhattan Chapter's Hearing Accommodation Task Force and the HLAA national office jointly announced an agreement with AMC Theatres to improve access for patrons who are deaf and have hearing loss. AMC committed to providing closed captioning devices at each of its 24 theaters in NY State by August 31, 2014.

The agreement has already led to captioning devices being available at AMC's Manhattan theaters, such as the Empire on 42nd Street and the Loews Lincoln Square on the Upper West Side. Captioning systems are being installed at other multiplex locations as their auditoriums are converted from film to digital projection.

Look for a "CC" notation in newspaper and online listings, including Captionfish.com, or call the theater to confirm the availability of captioning before you leave home. Not every first-run English-language film is made available to the theaters with captioning and not all auditoriums showing a captioned film have the captioning systems.

Hearing Conditions You May Not Know About

Meniere's Disease: If you experience vertigo that doesn't go away, it may be Meniere's Disease, a chronic inner ear disorder that affects balance and hearing. This is thought to be caused by improper balance of fluid in the inner ear.

Diplacusis: Individuals with diplacusis have double hearing. They experience a shift in pitch perception, causing them to hear one sound as two. Although musicians typically notice this condition more than others, it occurs frequently in individuals who have normal hearing in one ear and sensorineural hearing loss in the other.

Otitis Media: If you've recently had a cold and can't hear well, you may have otitis media – otherwise known as a good, old fashioned ear infection. While this condition is typically considered a childhood disease, it can strike people of any age.

Acoustic Neuroma: Although a rare condition, it's the most common form of brain tumor and affects roughly two of every 100,000 people. This slow-growing benign tumor develops on the eighth cranial nerve that connects the ear to the brain. Symptoms can include loss of hearing in one ear, ringing (tinnitus), dizziness (vertigo) and balance problems.

Usher syndrome: Usher syndrome is responsible for three to six percent of all childhood deafness and 50 percent of deafness and blindness in adults. Usher syndrome is inherited.
