### Vacations

Most of us go on vacation once or twice a year. I hope most of our members are lucky enough to do so. So, here are some of my experiences which I hope will be helpful to those of you who do take vacations. For all the others, these tips also apply because they helps no matter where you are.

In booking your trip, try to get information from the booking agent, hotel, resort, cruise line etc. about any and all devices that may be available for people with hearing loss as well as what other services they can provide for you; i.e., is there captioning on the TV, do the tour guides they provide have assisted listing devices on buses and at the destination of the tour? Can you choose your seating arrangements that better accommodates you? Is there safety equipment for people with hearing loss such as fire alarms with flashing strobe lights and in the event of emergency, how will you be notified? People with hearing loss traveling alone or with another hearing loss person need to know about these issues.

I also travel with my own personal Bluetooth device. It connects to a remote microphone that I can place in front of a TV or on a table as well as attach it to my wife's clothing. It enables the sound to go directly to my hearing aids eliminating any outside noise. It also connects to my phone so it's a pretty handy device. Most of the time things get tough at airports, checking in at hotels, at restaurants, and a bunch of other things. I travel with my wife who has no hearing issues. I recommend travel with a hearing person as the best solution to most problems if possible. Well worth the extra cost.

We all have some little methods we use which helps us throughout the day. These are mine and I came by them after many years of traveling with hearing loss. ## **New Captioning Rules**

# CC

The FCC has issued new captioning rules for television. It's part of the 21st Century Communications and Video Accessibility Act rollout. The commissioner has voted to keep primary responsibility for captions squarely on the shoulders of programmers (like TV broadcasters and cable operators) while shifting some of the burden to video programming owners and producers. In effect, programmers will be responsible for

captions on their television shows, while distributors (cable companies) will still be expected to handle the delivery and technical aspects of captioning. Commission Chairman Tom Wheeler said:

"Today's Commission action on closed captioning is about responsibility. Those who produce and distribute video for television have a shared responsibility to ensure that closed captioning is both available and accurate. Likewise, this agency has a responsibility to seize on this moment in time which, for the first time in human history, offers us real opportunities to address the communications challenges faced by tens of millions of Americans with disabilities. We are making significant progress on this front and I thank my fellow Commissioners for joining me in this important work."
