Riding the Rails Long Island Railroad / MTA Subway / Metro-North

I'm an advocate. It wasn't something I intended to be. It just sort of happened along the way when I lost my hearing.

I have always had a problem with injustice of any kind; and hearing loss being the "silent handicap" that it is, seems to be filled with an incredible amount of injustice out there in the world. And so I fight.

I've also just crossed the border recently. My years as a person with a hearing loss are now equal to the years I once lived as a person with hearing. It has caused me to have a bit of reflection, a slight pause, but apparently it hasn't stopped the forward direction of activism. It seems as though I'm always fighting for something.

I go to my computer, I look up a page, a video comes on, it's not captioned, I write an email. A magazine arrives, it offers online classes, I go to the link, the classes are not caption, and I write another email. Public television offers a DVD of a show that they have just broadcast with captions, I call to order the DVD, I ask if the DVD is captioned, no one knows...and I write...an email; only to discover that the show, they've just broadcast "with captions" is not offered with captions on the DVD! Injustice! I mean really; how can they broadcast a show captioned, but not caption the DVD? And anyone who sells DVD's on television should be using the closed caption symbol when they advertise so we'd know if the DVD is captioned or not. It shouldn't be this difficult in 2016.

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May Meeting Recap

On Wednesday, May 18, we had the pleasure of participating in a presentation about aural rehabilitation and disability law presented by Dr. Susan Antonellis, Operations Manager at the Mill Neck Services Center for Hearing Health and Loretta H. Murray, Esq. Both speakers have a long history with HLAA and with working with the hearing impaired. Dr. Antonellis has worked extensively in the areas of aural rehabilitation and speech and hearing. Dr. Loretta Murray's law practice includes work with employment and disability law. The Center is located on the beautiful campus of the Mill Neck Manor School on Long Island.

The session started with a review of the Americans With Disabilities Act. It was emphasized that despite all the current laws protecting disabled children and adults, the laws mean little unless we learn to speak up and let others know what our needs are. Self advocacy, along with belonging to an organization such as HLAA is what will help us get some of the accommodations we need and are afforded to us under the various laws, especially in public places such as doctor's offices, airports, hotels, etc.

Dr. Antonellis gave us a good rationale for why aural rehabilitation is so important for hearing impaired adults. Aural rehabilitation keeps the brain active with listening activities and helps stimulate our brain to improve our ability to hear. Mill Neck has many programs that hearing impaired people could benefit from. Dr. Antonellis told us about some of the services that the Mill Neck Service Center for Hearing Health offers to hearing impaired adults. Their services include individual and group aural rehabilitation programs for adults with hearing aides. Sessions offer speech reading auditory training. Mill Neck also provides counseling on how to get the most out of your hearing aides and listening devices. Of particular interest to our

Many years ago I had a frightening experience while riding on a train. I asked some questions afterwards, no one knew the answers and so I wrote some letters. I wondered why there wasn't any real-time visual signage in the trains to help people who can't hear when there is a change of service or an emergency on board.

Post 9/11, I wondered even more why a visual communication system for people who can't hear was still virtually non-existent on major public transportation, and why do we still rely on garbled announcements that can't be understood?

Just last year I was doing some research on the computer and I guess the stars were in alignment that day because I was lucky enough to find some good people at DRNY (Disability Rights New York). I met with them in Brooklyn and we put our heads together and after many months and many hours we emerged with a survey for people with hearing loss or deafness, who travel the Long Island Rail Road, MTA Subway or Metro-North Trains.

Whether you travel for business or pleasure if you ride a train and you have a hearing loss, or are deaf, I invite you to participate in this survey. It's a place for your voice to be heard.

DRNY is surveying people who are deaf and hard of hearing about their experiences with visual announcement systems on trains in the New York City metro area. Some trains on the Long Island Rail Road, the New York City subway, and Metro-North have visual announcement systems on board to alert passengers to station stops, but the announcement systems may not provide accurate or detailed information in the event of an emergency. The survey is designed to gather data on the experience of people who are deaf and hard of hearing on trains during emergency situations. You may enter your name or not in the survey, however DRNY would prefer your name so they can follow up if necessary.
