We're happy to announce that Lincoln Center recently installed an Induction Loop for assistive listening in the Mitzi E. Newhouse Theater, in addition to the one previously installed in the Beaumont!

This means that if you wear an assistive listening device with a telecoil switch, you don't need a headset at all to access the clean, clear sound from the Induction Loop. Just toggle your T-switch for the signal.



If you don't have a telecoil-equipped device, you can still use a headset (available in the lobby) to try out the new system.

Captioning Will Soon Be at a Movie Theater Near You!

On June 10, 2010 the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) published an Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (ANPRM), "Nondiscrimination on the Basis of Disability by Public Accommodations – Movie Theaters; Movie Captioning and Audio Description." Six-and-a-half-years later, the DOJ has issued a Final Rule on the ANPRM.

In their Final Rule, the DOJ requires movie theaters to:

- have and maintain the equipment necessary to provide closed movie captioning and audio description at a movie patron's seat whenever showing a digital movie produced, distributed, or otherwise made avail-able
- provide notice to the public about the availability of these features, including on communications and advertisements at the box office, and other ticketing locations, on websites, mobile apps newspapers and via telephone. Third party websites are not required to provide that information.
- ensure that theater staff is available to assist patrons with the equipment before, during, and after the showing of a movie with these features.

We are thrilled to see movie captions recognized and required as an accommodation under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). However, we must make sure these new rules work. Don't be afraid to complain if you don't get the accommodations you need. And don't forget to compliment the theater on a job well-done. Your input is more than important; you can be a driving force behind making movies truly accessible to those with hearing loss!

Getting to Know: Service Animals

What is the legal definition of a service animal? Therapy Animals are not legally defined by federal law but there is a legal definition for service animals in the Americans With Disabilities Act. Service animals are specifically trained to help the disability-related needs of their handlers and are not considered 'pets'.

Is using a service animal protected in public places? Federal laws protect the rights of individuals with disabilities who are accompanied by their service animals in public places.

Does a guide dog have to be certified by the State to be an "official" guide dog? No. Any guide dog, signal dog, or other animal individually trained to provide assistance to an individual with a disability.

Can a business owner insist on proof of state certification before letting a service animal into the business? *No. Certificates, licenses or other physical proof that a dog qualifies as a service animal.*

What can a business owner ask the service dog handler? If the dog's function is not apparent, then the ADA permits only two kinds of questions. The business owner can ask, "Is this dog required because of a disability?" and "What specific assistive task or tasks has the dog been trained to perform?"

Under what conditions can a service animal be excluded from a facility? *Under ADA law, an animal can be excluded if it is a direct threat to the health or safety of other people or will disrupt the regular operation*

Bipartisan Bill Planned to Make Hearing Aids More Accessible and Affordable

By far the most frequently asked question into the HLAA national office is: "How do I afford hearing aids?" The most frequently viewed page on our website is the Financial Assistance page. Clearly there is a need for more affordable and accessible hearing devices.

For those with mild to moderate hearing loss, there is good news: U.S. Senators Elizabeth Warren (D-Mass.) and Chuck Grassley (R-Iowa) announced that they will introduce the Overthe-Counter Hearing Aid Act of 2016. The bipartisan legislation would make certain types of hearing aids available over the counter (OTC) and remove unnecessary and burdensome requirements that currently create barriers for consumers who could bene-fit from hearing aids. Approximately 30 million Americans experience age-related hearing loss, yet only about 14 percent of those with hearing loss use assistive hearing technology, often because they cannot afford costly hearing aids.

Senator Grassley's office reached out to HLAA for input and we will work with them to ensure that language concerning consumer protection measures and consumer education is included in the bill. We are also happy that legislation is being considered, that the need for an affordable option to high cost hearing aids for so many people is being taken seriously.

of the business. Handlers of service animals must obey local leash and vaccine laws and must have their dogs under control at all times. An example of an animal being a direct threat to public safety would be if the service animal was eating at tables or sitting on chairs meant for patrons.

Can businesses hold service animal owners responsible for damage done by the animal? Yes. Service-dog handlers are responsible for property damage just like other patrons.

Can businesses require the owners of service animals to pay "pet fees" or segregate them into "animal-friendly" areas? Because service dogs are not pets, the U.S. Justice Department, which is the ADA's primary enforcement authority, businesses cannot subject them to "pet fees" or segregation in "animal-friendly" areas.

Does an animal have to be able to do anything to be a service animal? Yes. A dog must be able to perform specific tasks that relate to a person's disability.

Are therapy animals protected in the same way? *Therapy, emotional-support, and companion animals are* considered pets and do not fall under the regulations provided by the ADA.
